1. Welcome to the second year of the Air Force ROTC General Military Course (GMC). Many of you are continuing after going through the AS100 year, while some of you may be joining us for the first time. I hope you will enjoy this semester and the curriculum we have developed for you. My goal is to ensure each of you receives a challenging and rewarding experience in preparation for Field Training. AFR 2130 COURSE DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVES

AFR 2130: Team and Leadership Fundamentals

1. **Course Description** – AFR 2130 This course is designed to provide a fundamental understanding of both leadership and team building. It is imperative that students are taught from the beginning that there are many layers to leadership, including aspects that do not always come to mind. Such things include listening, understanding themselves, being a good follower, and problem solving efficiently. The students will apply these leadership perspectives when completing team building activities and discussing things like conflict management. Students should demonstrate basic verbal and written communication skills. Students will apply these lessons at Field Training, which follows AS200.

I maintain an “open door” policy, which means you are encouraged to reach out to me with any questions or concerns. Should any circumstances arise, that could affect your performance or attendance, I recommend you keep me informed to prevent an adverse impact on your academic standing and military training. I’m available for office hours/appts most weekdays 0900 – 1500, appointments are recommended, but not required.
3. **Course Objectives/Lesson Objectives** – You should learn or comprehend the following information/concepts over the course of the semester:
 - Understand AS200 course material and the course requirements.
 - Understand the principles of ethical decision-making.
 - Understand the principles of self-awareness.
 - Understand that effective listening positively affects mission accomplishment.
 - Understand the principles of full-range leadership.
 - Understand the principles of followership.
 - Understand the principles of team building.
 - Understand the importance of initiative.
4. **Required Text** - All required texts can be accessed online through <http://elearning.ufl.edu/>. Readings will come from the text *Team and Leadership Fundamentals AS 200 Student Reader*, and AFH 33-337 (The Tongue and Quill).



AFR 2130: CLASS REQUIREMENTS & POLICIES

- 1. Uniforms:** All cadets will wear the uniform of the day (UOD) to class on Wednesdays or Thursdays (OCPs or New Cadet Uniform – Khakis and Polos) until official uniforms are issued. Air Force personal appearance standards must still be met IAW 36-2903. Academic Only or “Participating” students are not authorized OCP wear. If cadets need any uniform item replacements, please contact the Det 150 Office Manager at 352-294-0740. **Any cadet not in uniform when required** must explain in writing the circumstances for being out of uniform using the official memorandum and will be due to me no later than the beginning of the next class period.
- 2. Grading Criteria:** Grades will be determined as follows:

Failed AS Classes: Cadet may apply for re-entry, but the failed class(es) will have to be re-accomplished for AFROTC credit.

Incompletes: The Det/CC must approve all “Incompletes” for AS classes. “Incompletes” must not be used for unusual or unavoidable circumstances, such as an extended illness. “Incompletes” must not be used for make-up of unsatisfactory or delinquent work, or as a sanction for cadets who do not return uniforms. An “Incomplete” must be resolved NLT the end of the following term or it will constitute a failure.

3. **Assignments:** There will be a graded briefing, 1 graded written assignment, 1 briefing assignment, and 3 administrative assignments. Your administrative assignments consist of a draft form 48, the advisor signed 48 and your completed term counseling.

Instructor Points: These points will be based on evidence of preparation (i.e., being able to answer questions about the readings, etc.), and overall participation.

4. **Makeup Work/Exams:** Only in unusual or unavoidable circumstances will makeup work/exams be offered. These will be handled on a case-by-case basis. Requirements for class attendance and make up exams, assignments, and other work in this course are consistent with university policies and that can be found at <https://catalog.ufl.edu/UGRD/academic-regulations/grades-grading-policies/>
5. **Class Leader:** I expect you to appoint a class leader. Duties may be delegated, but the class leader remains fully responsible for the following.
 - a. Collecting assignments due prior to class start
 - b. Calling the classroom to attention
 - c. Attendance
 - d. Room care
 - e. Other activities assigned by the instructor
6. **Attendance:** All Cadets are preparing to be POC cadets and future Lieutenants, so I expect you to attend my class and to be on time. All students (cadet and academic-only) must attend at least 80 percent of scheduled class sessions or instructor approved substitute activities to achieve a passing grade. This equates to **NO MORE than 2 unexcused absences during the semester**. The attendance requirement is mandatory and is not flexible. It is professional courtesy to coordinate with me ahead of time if you are going to miss a class. All uncoordinated absences and tardiness will be explained in writing using an official memorandum due **no later than the beginning of the next class period**. The memos will be used to determine whether the absence or tardiness is excused. It is your responsibility to coordinate with me if you are late or tardy. Requirements for class attendance, make-up exams, assignments and other work in this course are consistent with university policies that can be found at <https://catalog.ufl.edu/ugrad/current/regulations/info/attendance.aspx>.

If you decide to drop, withdraw, or not meet the attendance requirements stated above, it is your responsibility to ensure you are administratively dropped by your registrar. If you do not meet attendance requirements and are still formally enrolled at the end of the semester in this class and/or the corresponding leadership lab, you will be awarded a failing grade.



7. **Class Comportment:** The atmosphere is military, but intellectually permissive. The classroom will be called to attention when the instructor enters. You are now AS200/250 cadets, and it is imperative that you follow the Air Force customs and courtesies you learned in your first year. Clear your desk of anything not needed for class. Snack food and drinks are permitted in the classroom. This is a policy/privilege that may be rapidly rescinded if proper care of academic facilities is not followed. Please ensure the room is clean before you leave the area.
8. **Class Dates & Times:** Class will be taught on Wednesday & Thursday from 11:45 to 12:35. Alternate class times will be discussed as required.
9. **Students With Disabilities:** Students with disabilities requesting accommodations should first register with the Disability Resource Center (352-392-8565), www.dso.ufl.edu/drc/ by providing appropriate documentation. Once registered, students will receive an accommodation letter which must be presented to the instructor when requesting accommodation. Students with disabilities should follow this procedure as early as possible in the semester.
10. **Academic Freedom/Integrity:** The free exchange of opinions and ideas is essential to the educational process, and to the greatest extent possible, faculty, students, and staff are encouraged to speak and write freely. "Statements, disagreements, and other comments made by individuals or groups in the educational forum are safeguarded through the practice of non-attribution" (AUI 36-2608, para. 2.4.). Due to our military profession, there are some limitations to our academic freedom. This subject will be briefed in detail at the beginning of the semester; if you have any questions see your instructor as soon as possible. Intentionally passing off someone else's work as your own (plagiarism) or gaining unfair advantage during exams (cheating) is not consistent with the integrity we expect of officer candidates. Confirmed plagiarism or cheating will result in a failing grade for the course and, if applicable, investigation for disenrollment from AFROTC. Do not reuse previous work from former assignments.
11. **Integrity** - Intentionally passing off someone else's work as your own (plagiarism) or gaining unfair advantage during exams (cheating) is not consistent with the integrity we expect of officer candidates. Confirmed plagiarism or cheating will result in an E for the course and, if applicable, investigation for disenrollment from AFROTC.

Generative AI Usage - AI, such as Chat GPT, Co-Pilot, Gemini etc., can be a great tool in the academic environment when used appropriately for generating ideas, interpreting, editing, and outlining. I will not tolerate a copy and paste response prompt from an AI source for your assignment paper. Our policy mirrors UF's Academic Integrity standards.
